They are known for being energy efficient and difficult to break. Casement windows are ideal over a sink or countertop. Homeowners may find it challenging that the outside of the window may only be cleaned outside. Ensure that the panes will be able to fully swing out before purchasing.

Hung

Hung windows are popular for their traditional look. Options include single- or double-hung. Single-hung windows move vertically while the top panel remains stationary. Both the top and bottom panes move with double-hung selections, creating exceptional airflow. These types of windows match the style of the home with a variety of wood grains and colors. They are also easy to clean.

Sliding

If you constantly need to open and shut windows, sliding windows are your best option. Similar to hung windows, this type has panes that move sideways. They are durable with a simple design that makes them an affordable option.
